 - Improve the behavioral health system.

- OHA Director Pat Allen announced internal reorganization steps at the Oregon Health Policy Board meeting the first week of May. Director Allen has re-established a Director of Behavioral Health position which will be accountable for BH Policy, Adult BH, Child and Family BH, BH Licensing and Certification and Substance Use and Gambling Disorder Treatment as well as have a role in directing prevention work in partnership with the PH Division.
- According to information posted by OHA on April 30th, IHN CCO has the potential of earning \$12,428,763 for their 2017 performance if they meet the PCPCH measure at .60 or better and meet at least 12 of the 17 metrics. CCOs can earn additional amounts with their achievement on the 4 challenge pool measures. See the document detailing potential payouts by CCO at this link:

- The first Public Health Accountability Metrics Report examines key health issues such as improving childhood immunization rates, reducing tobacco use and opioid overdose deaths, and ensuring access to clean drinking water. The 2018 report highlights where the public health and health care systems can work together to achieve shared goals. - On Friday, May 11th, Governor Kate Brown announced the award of 5 Housing Pilot Projects as a part of Future Ready Oregon. One of the pilot project awards went to

Lincoln County. The Workforce Housing Initiative is a collaborative partnership between local communities, the business sector and private developers. In Lincoln County, new income-qualified homebuyers will have opportunities to purchase a home through Proud Ground. Proud Ground uses a land trust model to combine a subsidy to lower the purchase price of homes on the open market with land lease and affordability covenants. Lincoln County, Newport, and Lincoln City will invest matching funds as well as partner with the local school district and other employers.

- An upcoming webinar titled “Insights on the CAC Experience” will be provided on Wednesday May 16, from 9-10 a.m.

“Because of my work outside of the CAC, I knew about the prevalence of undiagnosed mental health issues in kids. I brought the issue to the CAC, and we really took it on. We went to the CCO board with this information and, as a result, the CCO has made childhood trauma one of their priorities. In line with this priority, the CCO gave a grant to a local hospital clinic that funds a social worker to do ACE screening with pregnant women in order to do early intervention.”~ CAC Consumer Member
